Dear Friends of Poland:

As two important dates come together – America's 250th year of independence and the 100th year of Polish Declarations of Admiration and Friendship for the United States - the Polish Knights of Malta in Kraków invite all Polish American families to permanently engrave an ancestor's name in Kraków and help a child with disabilities.

A memorial wall is being built at the Church of St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe in Kraków. This church was consecrated by Pope St. John Paul II in 1983, who also laid its founding brick as Bishop. For \$1,000, you or your ancestor's name can be engraved on this wall, in this church, forever. The only qualification is that the person you chose to engrave be born in lands recognized as Poland today. We accept Polish-born men or women and their American-born Polish partners, Polish emigrants still living, and Polish American children born in America. This Wall is being built for the benefit of the Center for Disabled Children in Kraków.

To participate please go online to [Engrave A Name](#). Select \$1,000, then enter the details of the person you want to honor. If you don't have the details of the person you want to honor, don't worry, we will follow up to check all information before engraving. Entering this information online is optional. **Do worry about the cut-off date of October 1, 2026!** Any names collected after October 1, 2026, will be engraved if there is availability and sufficient demand. The unveiling ceremony is currently planned for November 8, 2026. Mark your calendars and join us in Kraków. Invitations will go out the first week of October.

Father Andrzej Kopicz said in a recent interview:

'Gratitude teaches us that we are not self-made, but a by-product of generations. Someone before us believed in us, worked, took risks, emigrated, began anew, building a family, a parish, a community. This project strongly conveys the thought that emigration involved a family decision, a moral effort, risk, hard work, and fidelity to one's roots, and that many emigrants created parishes, associations, and homes in which Polish identity was passed on to succeeding generations. Christian remembrance is not merely a way of looking back. **It is the grateful acceptance of a heritage and the question of what we'll do with that heritage today.** If we remember our ancestors only so their names may endure, that intention is less impactful than helping the living through their remembrance. **Mercy begins when gratitude transforms feeling into an active deed.'**

My colleagues and I hope you will agree that this is an exciting opportunity. We look forward to seeing you at the ceremony.

Their stories became part of both Polish history and the story of America itself.



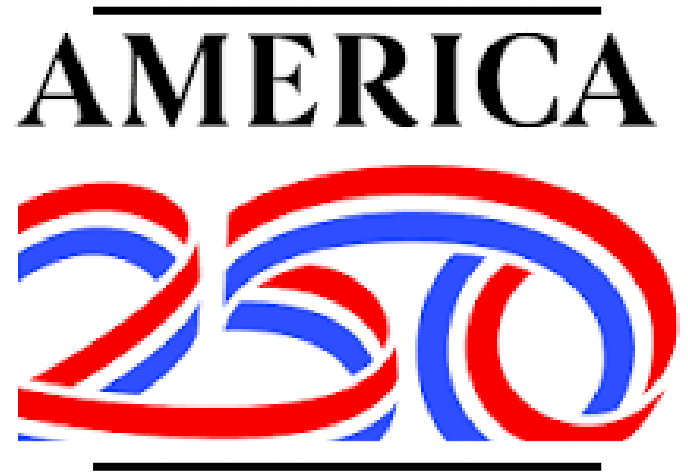

250 Years of American Independence

In 2026, America marks the 250th anniversary of its independence — a milestone honoring the generations of immigrants whose work, sacrifice, and ideals helped shape the nation.



100 Years since Polish Declarations of Admiration and Friendship

The year 2026 also marks the centenary of the Polish Declarations of Admiration and Friendship for the United States — a historic gesture of gratitude from the people of Poland to America in 1926. The result was 111 volumes signed by five million Polish citizens.

The Polish-American Wall of Remembrance transforms these anniversaries into a lasting legacy of gratitude, remembrance and mercy.

The Wall of Remembrance

A Permanent Place of Gratitude and Prayer



The Polish-American Wall of Remembrance will be created inside the Church of St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe in Kraków-Mistrzejowice.

The memorial will include:

- Multi-column commemorative inscriptions
- A central patinated bronze plaque
- A digital archive preserving family histories

Names will appear alphabetically, reflecting the shared dignity of every family story.

A Living Purpose

The Wall of Remembrance is not only a memorial project. Every commemorated name also directly supports children with disabilities and their families through the charitable mission of the Polish Knights of Malta Foundation in Kraków.

Funds raised through this campaign help:

- Support rehabilitation and therapy
- Strengthen educational services
- Provide family assistance
- Secure long-term stability for the Maltese Center
- Preserve compassionate care for vulnerable families

Social Impact

The Polish Knights built the Malta Center for Assistance to Disabled Children and their Families (MCPNDiIR) in 2004.

Our goal was to create a facility that would address the treatment and rehabilitation of children with disabilities.



- 22 Years
- 42,000 children
- Ages 0-7
- 900 children/year
- 200 volunteers

We provide assistance to:

- Children whose development is delayed, disharmonious or abnormal.
- Children with cerebral palsy, mental retardation, genetic defects and autism, among others.
- Families who need psychological support and assistance in raising and stimulating their child's development.
- Children offering individual and group classes, workshops, and therapy .

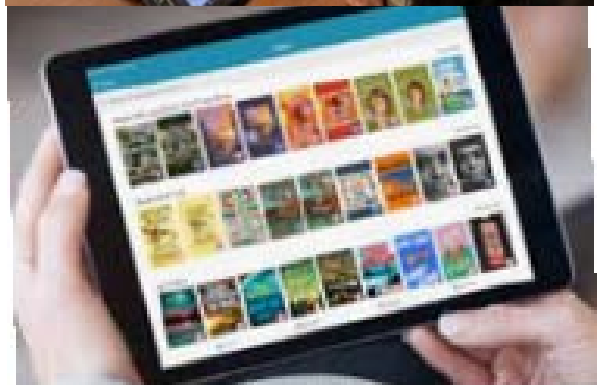
DIGITAL BOOK OF GRATITUDE

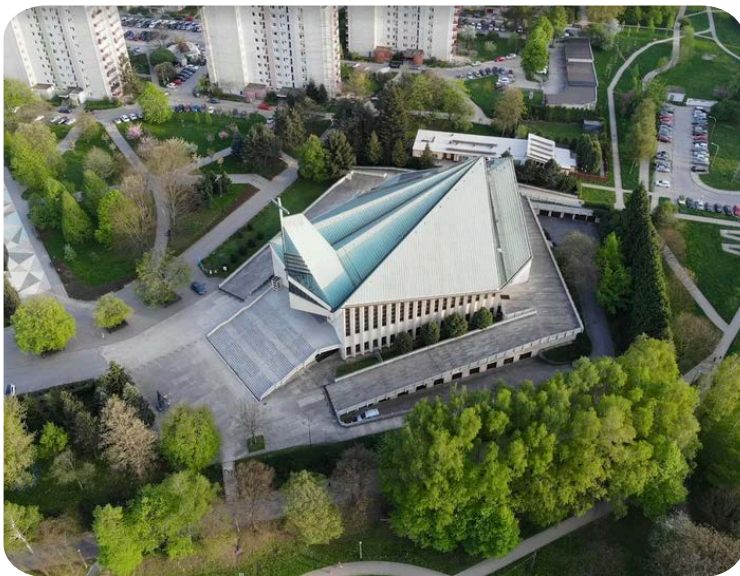
The Church

“once you belong, it’s forever”

The Church of St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe is a major Roman Catholic sanctuary built between 1976-1983. The church serves as a significant spiritual and symbolic site.

Key Features and History

- **Papal Connection:** The church was consecrated by Saint Pope John Paul II (Karol Wojtyła) in 1983 during his second pilgrimage to Poland. As Archbishop of Kraków, he previously laid the cornerstone in 1969.
- **Capacity:** The church is designed for large congregations, with an upper church accommodating 5,000 people and a lower church holding 2,000.
- **Anti-Communist Role:** During the 1980s, particularly under martial law, the church became a major hub for the "Solidarity" movement.
- **Symbolism:** The church is named after St. Maximilian Kolbe, the Polish Franciscan friar, and only known person to offer his life to save another at Auschwitz.
- **Significance:** Polish British emigrant Andrew Ciechanowiecki, a nobleman, diplomat, art historian and collector, provided funding for this church decorating it in a modern, cubist style. He is buried in its crypt.
- **Artistic Works:** The main altar features a six-metre-high statue of Christ Crucified by Kazimierz Gustaw Zemła.
